NEW POLL: Improving public perception



The extractives sector is in danger of losing its social licence to operate, Aggregate and Quarry Association and MinEx chief executive, Wayne Scott has said.

"I think we haven't done ourselves a great service, in terms of selling ourselves as a sector," Scott told *Inside Resources* in an executive interview, in November last year.

He referenced the dust issues surrounding Yaldhurst quarries, and the pending Fulton Hogan Templeton quarry application as just two examples of this.

"We need to have some serious discussions around how we maintain our social licence, and how we improve that public perception," he said.

Results of last poll

A recent survey of *Inside Resources* subscribers found that some readers wanted a more diverse range of views shared on the website.
