2018 saw worthy award winners

This year OceanaGold Waihi won the Innovation Award for gaining of community acceptance of blasting at its underground workings. Waihi residents were provided early warning of blasting, to prevent startling people.

Road Metals won the Health and Safety Initiative Award for its appointment of a dedicated health and safety manager. The company also has full involvement from company leadership, and demonstrated, marked improvement in workplace health and safety performance.

Greenbriar Ohai Coal won the Environmental Management Award for extinguishing an underground fire at Ohai coal mine in Southland. They also implemented diverse environmental mitigation measures, particularly in respect of biodiversity and freshwater.
